


**Figure 3:** Aaron Douglas (American, 1899-1979), *Flight*, from *The Emperor Jones* series, 1926. Woodblock print on paper. Courtesy of Collection of Jason Schoen, Princeton, New Jersey.




**Figure 7:** Aaron Douglas (American, 1899-1979), untitled drawing (The Artist) from *FIRE!! A Quarterly Devoted to Younger Negro Artists*, November 1926. Courtesy of Collection of Thomas H. Wirth, Elizabeth, New Jersey.


**Figure 10:** Aaron Douglas (American, 1899-1979), *Building Thee More Stately Mansions* 1944. Oil on canvas, Fisk University Galleries Collection, Fisk University.




Figure 14: Aaron Douglas (American, 1899-1979), The Burden of Black Womanhood, The Crisis cover, September 1927.




Figure 16: Celeste Smith, Excelsior, The Crisis interior image, January 1929.
