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ShiPu Wang is Associate Professor of Art History and founding faculty of Global Arts Studies Program at University of California, Merced. He specializes in twentieth-century art history and visual culture, with a focus on historical debates on race and nationalism in pre-WWII American art. He is one of a small group of scholars who have done extensive research to rediscover and reexamine the artistic production of American artists of Asian descent who were active before the Second World War.
