# Auslegung: A Journal of Philosophy

Auslegung is published semi-annually through the auspices of the University of Kansas. The Journal is intended as a forum for the expression of any and all scholarly philosophical perspectives. The editors are primarily interested in publishing the work of new Ph.D's and advanced students pursuing a degree in Philosophy. However, all technically competent philosophical work will be considered. Auslegung opposes all forms of discrimination on the basis of race, gender, creed, age, sexual orientation and national origin.

# **Guidelines for Paper Submission**

- 1. Papers should normally not exceed 30 typed, double-spaced pages, although longer papers may be considered in some cases.
- 2. Contributors should submit three, clear, error-free manuscripts in the style suggested by the MLA Style Sheet or of a recent issue of the journal. \*Please note that all footnotes/endnotes should be formatted as footnotes. Each paper should also include references.
- 3. An electronic copy of the paper should accompany the hard copies. Electronic copies should be saved in MS Word.
- For additional information about gender inclusive language, consult Virginia L. Warren's "Guidelines for the Nonsexist Use of Language" in APA proceedings 59 (1986): 471-484.
- 5. Auslegung subscribes to a blind review policy. Authors must therefore omit references that would allow them to be identified. Typescripts should be prefaced by a separate cover page giving the title of the article, the author's name, address, telephone number, email address, and academic institution. Authors should also include on a separate sheet a short, one paragraph, abstract.
- 6. Whenever possible, Auslegung furnishes copies of the referee's comments to contributors.
- 7. The deadline for submissions for the Fall/Winter issues is August 1; and for the Spring/Summer issues, February 1.

## **Guidelines for Book Reviews**

- In each book review, the reviewer should defend a thesis. The reviewer's thesis should advance an interpretative critique of the book under review. Also, the reviewer should state the thesis of the book under review. The reviewer should give the argument(s) of the book, and in discussing the argument(s), critically evaluate the argument(s).
- 2. The reviewer should treat her review as a compressed interpretation of a given book. Her sentences should be succinct and grammatically well-formed. The reviewer should avoid the use of footnotes and should cite the book under examination within the body of the review. Each review should read more like a thoughtful, well-ordered report and analysis than a critical but tangential essay. The goal of the reviewer is to inform philosophers about a particular text so that philosophers can decide whether the content of the text warrants reading. It is in this advisory role that a good reviewer must cast herself.
- 3. All reviews should include the name, institution, mailing address, and e-mail address of the potential reviewer.
