## Style Sheet for **SEEFA Journal**

#### **Acceptable submission formats**

Contributions should be submitted electronically. E-mail submissions should be sent as ASCII text (plain text), not as attachments in Microsoft Word or WordPerfect format. Submissions on floppy disk should be either ASCII text or WordPerfect documents; Microsoft Word documents are not accepted. If a submission contains diacritics, the electronic submission must be accompanied by a hard copy.

Preference is given to submissions in English.

### Style

Titles of books and journals should be underlined; titles of articles should be placed in quotation marks. Notes should appear at the end of the article, as standard text rather than formatted endnotes. All references to sources within endnotes should use the name/date format; full references should appear in the bibliography. All words and quotations in a language using the Cyrillic alphabet must appear in Library of Congress transliteration; the journal does not publish Cyrillic text. Foreign words should be italicized. Plurals of foreign words should not be Anglicized; i.e. one *bylina*, several *byliny*, not several *bylina*s). All foreign words and quotations must be accompanied by an English translation. Translations should not be literal; the translator should strive to produce a translation that will be comprehensible to an English reader unfamiliar with the original language.

### **Editor's Note**

As <u>SEEFA Journal</u> has grown, so have the editorial tasks. I am happy to report that thanks to the generosity of the Mel Leffler, Dean of Arts and Sciences at the University of Virginia, <u>SEEFA Journal</u> now has an editorial assistant, Lindsay Minnis, to assist with these tasks. Although Lindsay, a graduate student in the Slavic Department at the university, was hired only very recently, she has already provided invaluable help in putting out this issue of the journal.

This issue includes material on East, West, and South Slavic folklore, as well as Lithuanian folklore. The subject matter is equally diverse. Anna Brzozowska-Krajka discusses magic texts, while Joseph Conrad's article deals with South Slavic folk belief. Yelena and Sergey Minyonok look at the resilience of Russian summer rituals, and Svetlana Latysheva's article presents data on Russian calendary ritual lyric. There is also a wealth of bibliographic material. Robert Rothstein has translated the introduction and West Slavic sections of Krzysztof Wrocławski's bibliography of Slavic folkloristics, which appear in this issue. The remaining sections will be published in the future. The notes to Robert Rothstein's article in the last issue of the journal are reprinted in this issue; due to technical problems, the diacritics were printed incorrectly. Lina Valiukaite's book review and Iurii Novikov's report on the collecting of Russian Old Believer folklore in Lithuania provide information on Lithuanian folklore publications, and Margaret Beissinger reviews a new publication on South Slavic folklore. Finally, the list of folklore panels at AAASS appears on page 4.
