Journals of interest: Bulletin CILA is a publication of the Commission Interuniversitaire Suisse de Linguistique Appliquee, and is published by the Centre de linguistique appliquee de l'Universite de Neuchatel. This Journal contains many interesting articles in German and French. Topics such as linguistics, foreign language teaching and the language laboratory are included. The CILA also publishes a catalog of language instructional tapes (German, French, Italian and Spanish) which are available for purchase. The address listed on the catalog is Institut fur Sprachwissenschaft, Abteilung fur angewandte Linguistik Universitat Bern, Bern, Switzerland. We have no information at present concerning the availability for purchase of these tapes in non-European countries.

Bibliographies: The past few months have seen the publication of three major sources of bibliography for second language learning. All three sources have extensive references to mediated language instruction, the language laboratory and programmed learning. Listed chronologically, they are:

The 1970 ACTFL Annual Bibliography of Books and Articles on Pedagogy in Foreign Languages. Dale Lange, compiler. New York: MLA/ACTFL, 1971 (see also Vol. 4, iv(1971): 427-90 Foreign Language Annals). The section entitled "Equipment" lists 200 items dealing with instruction and research development emphasizing media from television to computers.

ERIC Documents on the Teaching of Foreign Languages: List Number 7. Carolyn Monka, compiler. New York: MLA/ACTFL, 1971 (see also Vol. 5, i (1971):112-29 Foreign Language Annals). Twenty-two items deal with language laboratories and television: an identical number deal with programmed instruction.

A service being contemplated by Phi Delta Kappa's School Service Information Service is the quarterly publication of citations to all documents encoded under descriptors for foreign language education. A one-year subscription is to be \$20. Each quarterly publication will list abstracts of citations having appeared in the previous three-month period. This service should provide the practitioner and the researcher with the means to keep abreast of the foreign language field — in FLES, in language teaching, curriculum, research, and mediated instruction.
