YESHIVA UNIVERSITY initiates a research-oriented Ph.D. program in BILINGUAL EDUCATIONAL-DEVELOPMENT PSYCHOLOGY

In response to the national need for qualified professionals who can provide the psychoeducational services to Hispanic community, the Ferkauf Graduate School of Yeshiva University will initiate the first training program in the United States leading to a Ph. D. degree in Bilingual Educational-Development Psychology. The program will stress interdisciplinary research versatility and the use of Spanish as a medium of instruction and scientific inquiry.

Scheduled to begin in the fall of 1981, the program will combine general and specialized area coursework, professional level language development and comprehensive research training through a sequence of courses, practica, seminars, internship and dissertation.
