NALLD REGIONAL MEETINGS: The NALLD Executive Board has recently decided that it will hold five regional meetings each year in conjunction with language meetings, corresponding approximately to the geographical areas established for the regions of the American Directory of Language Laboratory Directors: Northeast, Midwest, Southern, Mountain-Pacific, US and Canada.

Informal groups or local chapters of NALLD members are encouraged to sponsor locally additional meetings of interest to persons in both high schools and colleges. The Executive Board expects to soon prepare a packet which can be presented to groups or organizations suggesting how NALLD can assist them with speakers etc. for their program. NALLD members are encouraged to organize local chapters of NALLD. A charter will be granted for a local chapter when its constitution is approved by the Executive Board; the national constitution is available from the Publication Center.

Notice of local meetings will be printed in the NALLD NEWSLETTER as long as deadlines are met.

AMERICAN LANGUAGE LAB DIRECTORY: Mr. Yusuke Kawarabayashi, College of the Pacific, has been appointed Mountain Pacific Editor of the Directory. Professor LaMarr Kopp, Pennsylvania State University, has been appointed chairman of the Committee on the American Language Laboratory Directory. He succeeds Dr. Evelyn Uhrhan Irving, University of Guelph, whose excellent service to the Association still continues as president-elect and program chairman. The position of chairman of this standing committee entails membership on the executive board.

ERFA: (Erfahrungsaustauschring Sprachlabor) a German publication of an organization similar to NALLD has several items that might be of interest to NALLD members.

- 1) ERFA has instituted a tape exchange service among its members. Those wishing to participate submit a list of tapes that they have produced and other members may then contact them to obtain dubs. (What would be the reaction to NALLD instituting such a service?)

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR RESEARCH IN MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGE AND AREA STUDIES UNDER TITLE VI, NDEA

This research program has not been conceived to be limited to a narrow view of language or of language instruction. It includes support of research in area studies as dealing with the matrix of language. Qualified institutions, organizations, and individuals are invited to submit proposals for research support in the following activities:

- Studies and surveys to determine the need for increased or improved instruction in modern foreign languages and area studies.
- --- Research and experimentation in more effective methods of teaching modern foreign languages.
- Development of specialized materials for use in teaching the language, history, politics, economics, and other aspects of the foreign areas under study.

Support for developing specialized teaching materials is restricted to the modern foreign languages and world areas which are clearly significant but have not customarily formed part of American academic offerings. When the research emphasis is on more effective methods of teaching rather than on the development of teaching materials, it may focus on any modern foreign language or foreign area.

The Office of Education is interested particularly in proposals for research in the following fields:

- 1. Psychology of foreign language learning
- 2. Instructional methods and the application of linguistics and new technology in language learning
- 3. Production of basic curricular materials for non-Western languages and area studies
- 4. Culture and civilization of foreign regions
- 5. Interaction between language and other aspects of a foreign culture

Project proposals should contain clear, detailed statements of research procedures and expected results. While a research proposal submitted at any time will receive consideration, it is suggested that proposals for research which are intended to start in the summer or fall of 1969 should be submitted before January 15, 1969. Money available in the current fiscal year to support language and area research should be committed before the end of February, 1969.

After screening by the staff of the Language and Area Research Section, each proposal is reviewed by experts in the academic community. Proposals are evaluated on the basis of their recommendations and in accordance with policies established by the Commissioner of Education. Since review and negotiation may take as long as four or five months, it is advisable to propose a beginning date for the project that takes this fact into consideration. Records for all expenditures and a final government audit are required.
