Malcolm Gibson, assistant professor of journalism, has been chosen as the interim general manager and news adviser to *The University Daily Kansan*. Gibson's appointment follows an internal search by the School of Journalism for a candidate to replace Tom Eblen, who will retire on Dec. 21 after 15 years with *The Kansan*.

Gibson came to KU in 1996 and has taught editing courses as well as international journalism.

Before joining the KU faculty, Gibson held reporter and editor positions with *The Gainesville Sun*, *The Hendersonville Times*-*News*, *The Miami Herald* and The Associated Press.

"He had a Cardinals plate on the Explorer," his wife, Laura Katich, said. "He would go to the baseball games when he could get there."

E. John Katich, associate professor of journalism, died early Oct. 5 after a fouryear battle with prostate cancer. Katich taught courses in sales strategy and media management.

He was born July 1, 1950, in St. Louis. He majored in history at the University of Missouri and earned his master's degree in journalism at the school.

Katich came to Lawrence in 1984 to start and manage TV-30, a low-power station. He began teaching part time at KU in January 1985. He became an assistant professor in 1986 and an associate professor in 1991.

To boost readership, Gibson plans to encourage the student leadership to pursue stories that more directly affect student readers.

"The stories need to better pertain to the students," Gibson said, "and this means approaching stories in a new way or in a nontraditional way."

Gibson also aims to make *The Kansan* a "model of convergence" in which stories written for print will cross over to other media more often and more easily. And, while focusing on the business of the newspaper, Gibson believes that *The Kansan* should first and foremost serve as an instructional tool.

Gibson's term is for one year. A national search will take place Fall 2002 for a permanent general manager.

Wendy Brown, who graduated from the University in 2000, said Katich was her adviser.

"When I was trying to find a job, he played a prominent role," she said. "He was more than a professor; he was a friend."
