

KU Journalism Loses Mel Adams, John Ginn



Mel Adams, retired associate professor of journalism, died March 27. A long-term business adviser to the *University Daily Kansan*, Adams taught advertising courses in the School for nearly 30 years before retiring in 1989. He was 80. "Mel made countless important contributions to the School," Dean Jimmy Gentry said. "He taught thousands of students and for decades placed interns into their first advertising experiences." The family has suggested that contributions be made to the Mel Adams Fund at the School.

John Ginn, the School's Knight Foundation Distinguished Professor of Journalism, died Feb. 9. "It is a major loss, not just to the School, but also to the University of Kansas," Gentry said. Ginn's teaching specialties were media management, ethics, editorial writing and editing. He chaired

the *University Daily Kansan* Board and was active in KU's Center for Teaching Excellence and on the Lied Center Board. Ginn had undergone treatment for cancer for the past three years. He was 62.

J-School Launches Multi-media Web Product



The Digital Jayhawk debuted in a big-screen demonstration during an April 2 campus ceremony in Budig Hall. The Digital Jayhawk is a multi-media product that will offer news, sports, entertainment and other items of interest to KU students, faculty, staff, alumni and friends, providing students with experience in Web design and production, streaming of audio and video, and other Web-related technologies. A \$75,000 gift from **The Freedom Forum** provided funds to hire Chris Ryan as professional-in-residence for one year for the project.

The Digital Jayhawk was featured on *Editor & Publisher* magazine's online site in a column, "Preparing Students for Media Convergence." "What's being done at KU," wrote Steve Outing, "is a harbinger for other journalism programs." The Digital Jayhawk's URL is **www.digitaljayhawk.org**.

Technology Upgrades Continue

KUJH-TV, the School's low-power station, began appearing on the Sunflower Cablevision system in March. On cable, KUJH will be able to reach approximately 40,000 households in the Lawrence area. Planning is under way to provide on-demand, searchable access to all KUJH news material on the Digital Jayhawk.

Broadcast students will soon be working with two high-quality Hitachi video cameras, donated by CBS as a result of efforts by KU alum Tim Maher, who works for the network. The 5-year-old cameras are in perfect working order and include a playback mechanism that will allow students to read the news from a TelePrompTer rather than looking down at pieces of paper.

The School's Web site has been redesigned. The URL is www.ukans.edu/~jschool.

KJHK-FM, the School's radio station, has completed a power increase to 2,900 watts. The station's signal should reach the state line to the east and near Manhattan to the west, with a potential audience of one million people.
