KU Journalism Reaccredited

The William Allen White School of Journalism and Mass Communications was granted reaccreditation in April by the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications. An accrediting team visited the School in October. It identified the strengths of the program as faculty, excellence in teaching, student body, administrative leadership, private support and pioneering efforts to prepare students for media convergence.

"I am heartened by the accreditation team's visit," said University of Kansas Chancellor Robert Hemenway. "They clearly were impressed with the School, its faculty and the dean. As one of them said in our interview, 'The students are getting as good an educational experience at KU as anywhere in the country."

Dean's Club Provides Computers, Student Assistants and Scholarships

Unrestricted funds from Dean's Club members provided computers, audio-visual equipment and furniture for the computer labs during the past year. These resources also were used to hire student assistants in the labs and provide scholarships critical to recruiting top students, retaining minority students and assisting students with financial need.

"The Dean's Club provides resources for positive and rapid change at the School," said Dean Jimmy Gentry, "from short-term needs not funded by the state budget to major initiatives that expand the School's programs."

Technology Upgrades Continue

The University of Kansas provided two special grants to the School during the spring semester. A \$53,000 grant is being used to totally upgrade one of the School's computer labs, to purchase computers to drive scanners and for a character generator for closed captioning in the TV lab. To upgrade faculty computing, KU funded \$57,000 in enhancements, primarily for desktop and laptop computers.

The Journalism Career Center's Job and Internship List is now available online to students. The site was developed as a special project by Bob Basow and Cade Cruickshank. Student News and Honors

Students received journalism degrees at the May 23 University of Kansas Commencement. The School also honored its graduates at a recognition ceremony and reception earlier that day. Twenty-four students received master's degrees, and 186 students received bachelor's degrees.

KU Journalism took fifth place in the print category of the annual William Randolph Hearst Foundation's Journalism Awards Program. Five students received individual awards in the national competition. More than 100 journalism schools and departments participate in the competition. "We've been in the top five the last three or four years," said Rick Musser, who directs the KU contestants.

The advertising staff of the University Daily Kansan won three first-place awards at the College Newspaper Business and Advertising Managers convention in April. The awards were for full-color ad, retail promotion and house ad campaign.

The University Daily Kansan Editorial Board earned first-place recognition in the Society of Professional Journalists Region 7 Mark of Excellence Awards. Individual students received three additional first-place designations and one second-place award.
