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A WORKING BIBLIOGRAPHY OF THE LANGUAGES OF (ROUGHLY)
THE WESTERN UNITED STATES
([-Athapaskan], [+Haida, Tsimshian, Wakashan])

There are three great laws of bibliography:

1. You missed something
2. The majority of readers will not agree with your parameters
3. You missed something else

With these restrictions in mind, what is presented here is a working bibliography of the languages of the Western United States. This bibliography is intended and designed primarily for the beginning student of North American languages who has not yet managed to remember who worked with what and when. Most bibliographies of North American languages are oriented toward the specialist, listing works under the author's name. This has certain disadvantages for the uninitiated who do not know the history of the field. Arranging the entries according to language alleviates some of these problems and is the method adopted here. Within each language, the entries are arranged by date of publication, so a fairly complete history of the research conducted in each language can quickly be obtained. For the student looking for a gap in the research to fill with a dissertation or the theorist looking for information on a wide range of languages, this bibliography should provide a useful working tool.

There are several reasons why I have drawn the line of inclusion roughly along the easternmost ranges of the Rockies. First, this is the region in which I have my primary research interests. This is usually a fundamental element in any bibliographer's work. Second, this demarcation line seems to be a valid geographic boundary between those groups whose homelands lie in the Intermountain West or on the Pacific Coast and those groups whose homelands lie back East or in the far North. With the sole possible exception of Wiyot and Yurok, all the languages of the Western United States included herein have their earliest traceable origins west of the Wind Rivers/Front Range/Sangre de Cristo line. Finally, the linguistic materials for the majority of these languages are fairly recent in nature. No existing published bibliography fully covers this area, the bibliographies of Native Languages of the Americas omit Kiowa and are of varying thoroughness, while the bibliographies of The Languages of Native America concentrate on comparative/historical work.

I have tried to include works of linguistic value and not simply everything which had a word or two transcribed in English orthography. I have avoided ethnographies which sometimes contain a smattering of words in transcriptions of varying quality. I have mainly included English works published after 1900, although both of these generalizations have exceptions. I have generally ignored pedagogical and bilingual materials although, in some cases where the materials were either the sole available grammars or were of widely recognized quality, I have included them. I have also avoided the infamous "in press" designation, even though some of the items "in press" (especially the grammatical sketches due in the revised Handbook of North American Indians) probably have as wide a circulation now as they will when published. I have also not included listings of papers read at conferences unless the proceedings were subsequently published. Dissertations which were later published are listed separately if they bear a different title from the published version.

Bibliographical work is a tedious, time-consuming, and often boring job with little immediate satisfaction and no startling breakthroughs. It is a task which relies heavily on luck and sweat and is generally a case of standing on the shoulders of others and then bracing so another can stand on yours when you have finished. I am especially grateful for the following shoulders:
