## The Statia Bank Tree Anole (Anolis bimaculatus) on Dominica, Lesser Antilles

On 4 December 2011, Quarantine Officer Gwandoyah James intercepted two anoles on a container at the Woodbridge Bay Port at Fond Cole in Dominica. The consignment of heavy equipment had originated in St. Christopher (= St. Kitts), another Lesser Antillean island

approximately 270 km northwest of Dominica. The lizards, both males, were identified from photographs as *Anolis bimaculatus* by R. Powell. The larger individual had a snoutvent length (SVL) of ~77 mm and total length (TL) of ~215 mm. The SVL of the smaller lizard was ~58 mm and TL was 150 mm. Both lizards have been preserved and are being held at the Forestry, Wildlife & Parks Division in Roseau. A photographic voucher is deposited in the Milwaukee Public Museum (MPM Herpetology P762).

Anolis bimaculatus is endemic to the Statia Bank, which consists of St. Eustatius (Statia), St. Christopher (St. Kitts), and Nevis. An adult female was previously observed and photographed by Gwandoyah James at the Woodbridge Bay Port in March 2008 (Powell et al. 2011), but was not seen after a short interval. Elsewhere, an introduced population of A. bimaculatus onto St. Maarten (Powell et al. 1992), presumably from St. Eustatius, apparently failed (Powell et al. 2005, 2011).
