

A New Distribution Record of the Arrow-headed Trinket Snake (*Coelognathus* helena nigriangularis) in Chhattisgarh, India

The recently described Arrow-headed Trinket Snake (Coelognathus helena nigriangularis) usually occurs in dry and moist tropical deciduous forests and has been recorded inside limestone caves and under boulders (Mohapatra et al. 2016). The species has been recorded previously from Madhya Pradesh (Edake 2011; Kumbhar et al. 2011), parts of Odisha (Mohapattra et al. 2016), Andhra Pradesh (Kantimahanti et al. 2015), Jharkhand (Lampe and Lindholm 1902; Srivastava et al. 2013), Maharashtra (Schulz 2013; Ashaharraza and Bibekar 2019), West Bengal (Chowdhury et al. 2018), Rajasthan (Singh et al. 2020), and Chhattisgarh

(Mohapatra et al. 2016) (Table 1). However, the snake recorded from southern Chhattisgarh was a personal communication (Mohapatra et al. 2016) and lacks photographic evidence and a precise location.

We herein report a record of *Coelognathus helena nigri*angularis from Churcha, Koriya District of Chhattisgarh, India (Fig. 1). This individual was rescued from the South Eastern Coal Limited (SECL) Regional Hospital in Churcha (23°20'14.32"N, 82°31'58.09"E) on 4 August 2020 and was released approximately 50 m from the site of rescue. This second locality record for this subspecies in Chhattisgarh and the




Fig. 2. A map of India depicting previously published locality records (red dots) and a second locality record (orange diamond) for the Arrow-headed Trinket Snake (*Coelognathus helena nigriangularis*) in Chhattisgarh.

first for the Koriya District is 494 km north of the previous record in southern Chhattisgarh and 166 km from the nearest known locality in Madhya Pradesh (Fig. 2). A photographic voucher has been deposited in the Milwaukee Public Museum (MPM VZP 1007). The identity of the species was confirmed by Pratyush Mohapatra, Zoological Survey of India, CZRC, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh, India.

Other species of snakes rescued from the site are the Spectacled Cobra (Naja naja), Indian Rock Python (Python molurus), Common Krait (Bungarus caeruleus), Common Wolfsnake (Lycodon aulicus), Checkered Keelback (Fowlea piscator), Duméril's Black-headed Snake (Sibynophis subpunctatus), Indian Ratsnake (Ptyas mucosa), Banded Krait (Bungarus fasciatus), and Russell's Viper (Daboia russelii). The Common Trinket Snake (Coelgnathus helena helena) also occurs in this area.
